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Devotional written by Emily Furda Read Lamentations 3:21-24

We all have people in our lives we expect to be faithful. We expect a parent to faithfully love and care for her children. We expect clergy members to faithfully serve God and the people He brings into their lives. We expect law enforcement and military members to faithfully serve their communities and countries. We expect friends to be faithfully love us. We expect ourselves to be faithful.

At some point, we all will disappoint people. Sometimes we are intentionally unfaithful. Other times, we make mistakes that may seem as if we're unfaithful when we're not. If flawed humans are our only example of faithfulness, how do we grasp the unfailing, abundant faithfulness of God?

This month's theme verses are from the book of Lamentations and likely written by the prophet Jeremiah right before or during the time Babylon took the people of Israel into captivity for 70 years. He was so deeply grieved that he was lamenting the state of his fellow Jewish people. He knew they had sinned, he knew they had been unfaithful, and he knew the immense pain they were in. In these verses Jeremiah is reminding himself of God's compassion and faithfulness, no matter what happened.

We need those same reminders in our lives. The more we learn about who God is, the easier it is to trust His unfailing, abundant faithfulness. God is faithful to every one of us in every circumstance, no matter the cause. It was true in Jeremiah's time, and it's still true today.

Devotional written by Christine Perry Read Isaiah 30:18 What have you learned about God's abundant faithfulness this week? Journal, draw, write a poem, or write a prayer about it below.

Have you ever felt so torn apart by someone that you forgot who you were? Have you questioned what God was really like in the face of an abusive or toxic spiritual leader? Maybe instead of a God of grace, you saw a legalistic God. Instead of mercy you only saw judgment.

Where is God in the midst of all of that? What are His thoughts?

This side of eternity, things, people and circumstances won't always make sense. But God's character doesn't change! In Isaiah 30:18 says:

"Yet the Lord longs to be gracious to you; therefore he will rise up to show you compassion." NIV

Wounds by a spiritually abusive or toxic leader don't go away in a month. It often takes years to allow God's truth wash out the toxicity out of your heart, mind and soul. It can feel lonely and dark. Maybe you keep thinking, "All I wanted was to serve God and you end up walking away devastated and lost."

But God is faithfully there. He is with you in the darkness, in the confusion and in the pain. He is for you and not against you. Friends, He is weeping with you. He knows what it's like to be persecuted by religious leaders. He knows what it's like to have your reputation smeared through the mud. Jesus is gentle and kind, slow to anger and abounding in love. His yoke is easy, and His burden is light. Fasten yourself to Him. He will help you walk towards healing, for by His stripes we are healed.

Also, pray for spiritual leaders who currently influence you. They can be anyone, from someone you have a personal relationship with to authors and speakers.

It can seem like we will never find that perfect peace we are supposed to have as followers of Christ.

Saturday, April 13 2019

Devotional written by Emily Furda Read Matthew 21:1-11

Tomorrow we celebrate Palm Sunday. It often means waving palm branches as we sing, but have you ever wondered why specific things happened that day as Jesus entered Jerusalem? Every detail was important and had a special meaning.

Why did Jesus ride a donkey instead of a horse? In biblical times, a horse was often seen as a symbol of war, but a donkey was a symbol of peace. Jesus wasn't coming to start a war. He was coming to bring peace. Why did they wave palm branches? In Roman times, palm branches were waved during a time of victory. The procession was a foretelling of His coming victory. Why did people spread their cloaks on the ground? That may have originated as a sign of respect for King Jehu in 2 Kings 9:13. They also served to protect Jesus from a thick haze of dust as people lined the dirt road. Everything was something usually reserved for the procession of a king, including what the people shouted in the streets.

They shouted "Hosanna" as Jesus passed them. Hosanna means "save us".* This expression is used several times throughout the Bible. Originally "save us" was a cry of desperation, begging for help. On Palm Sunday, it was shouted as a declaration and celebration. They cried out with joyful shouts knowing Jesus would save them.

There was just one problem, a big problem.

The people lining the streets assumed Jesus came to be their earthly king and rescue them from the oppressive Roman rule. Afterall, He was given a king's welcome. Many of these same people demanded His death just days later when they realized they were wrong. They saw the signs of honor reserved for an earthly king but completely missed that the spiritual kingdom Jesus reigns over is so much greater than any earthly kingdom.

Sometimes, we assume things we see mean something different than what God is trying to show us. We make up our minds without ever asking God to show us what it all means. When things don't work out the way we think they will, or the way we want them to, it's easy to think we're wrong about the character of God and His promises. He remains our faithful savior, even when we find ourselves distraught because of our wrong assumptions. In the tearful moments when all we can manage is a silent prayer asking God to save us, He hears us. In the celebratory moments, He hears our praise as we declare His salvation. Jesus is always our faithful savior, no matter what happens.

Jesus knew those people who were celebrating Him that day in Jerusalem would turn their backs on Him just a few days later, but He knew they were worth dying for. He knows you will go your own way and doubt who He is at times, and He knew you are worth dying for. Whether you find yourself unable to speak because of the unbearable pain in your soul or you're celebrating victory in your life, let Palm Sunday be a reminder Jesus is your faithful savior and king.

So when Jesus looked down and saw the disciple he loved standing with her, he said, "Mother, look—John will be a son to you." Then he said, "John, look—she will be a mother to you!" From that day on, John accepted Mary into his home as one of his own family. Matthew 19:26-27 TPT

It's believed that at some point before Jesus's crucifixion Joseph, Mary's husband, passed away. During that time, women had very little power and usually couldn't be self-sufficient. If a woman became a widow, her firstborn son was to care for her. If he passed away, the second born brother would assume the role. Jesus was Mary's firstborn son, but Mary and Joseph had other sons. So, why did Jesus tell John to take care for His mother instead of one of His brothers? Jesus saw not just Mary's physical needs but also her emotional and spiritual needs. Jesus's brothers didn't believe He was the Messiah (John 7:5). After His resurrection, Jesus's brothers did come to believe in Him, but Jesus knew Mary needed someone in that moment to care for her as well as after He ascended into Heaven. That person was His disciple, John who also gained a mother figure. Mary was someone who John could trust and confide in, especially when it came to his faith.

It may not have made sense in that moment why John was to assume the role of Mary's son, but Jesus had a good reason. If Jesus could see Mary and all of her needs in the middle of unimaginable physical, emotional, and spiritual pain, He can surely see all of our needs now. Sometimes, when Jesus provides for us, it doesn't make sense at first, but He will always faithfully provide for all of our needs, even the ones we don't know we have.
