When we keep our focus on God and allow Him to be the dwelling place for our thoughts and emotions, He promises to give us peace. Sometimes, keeping our mind focused on Him can be harder that it sounds. Our minds seem to never stop racing. Even when we're falling asleep at night, we can't quiet our whirling minds. It can feel like another area we're failing at and make us not even want to try to keep our hearts tuned to God, but even when we fail to keep our hearts and minds on Him, he is lovingly waiting for us, longing to be our peaceful dwelling place without judgment or punishment.

It takes practice to be intentional about keeping our hearts and minds focused on Him, but the peace He has for us is worth it. There are some practical things we can do. We can write down some scriptures and put them inside a cupboard door, on the refrigerator, or even in our slip them in a pocket or purse. When we're digging for the elusive hair tie in the bottom of the purse, we'll likely stumble on a scripture. We can have some scriptures typed out in an app on our phones or written out in a small notebook. It's also a good idea to be mindful about what we're hearing, reading, and watching. Try switching to some Christian music at times. Making playlists for different situations or moods can help us stay focused. It can also be wise to limit social media. Sometimes, it's not necessarily the amount of time we spend online but what we're reading. We start off checking on a close friend's status and before we realize it, we've spent an hour reading articles about everything about the latest celebrity gossip, to diet tips that make us feel inferior, and even a possible encounter someone had with a unicorn in 1842.

When it comes to setting spending alone time with God, it doesn't have to be at a specific time of day. For some of us, our brains and schedule make it hard for us to spend as much time as we'd like in the morning. If that's the case, why not spend time alone with God in the afternoon or evening? We can bookmark what we read or write down our thoughts. Then, in the morning pray and have a quick review before we start the day. If mornings work best for alone time, then, try the opposite. It may vary from day to day. Time of day isn't nearly as important as simply spending time with God.

The more we're intentional about spending time alone with God and turning our thoughts to Him throughout the day, the more we'll find our hearts and minds dwelling in the peace of His presence.

When was the last time you felt afraid? Is there something weighing heavily on your mind, draining your energy and testing your resolve? Some days the battles just feel too much. In fact, they are too much for us, but they are no match for the Lord of Angel Armies!

Pause for a minute and think about what that name means. Some translations also say, "Lord Almighty" or "Lord of Hosts." They all mean "Jehovah Sabaoth" which refers to God being in charge of armies of angels. It's a powerful meaning.

The Passion Translation puts it this way:

Here he comes! The Commander! The mighty Lord of Angel Armies is on our side. The God of Jacob fights for us! Pause in his presence. Psalm 46:7 TPT

Sometimes, when we're afraid we try to take matters into our own hands. but when we remember the God of Angel Armies is our dwelling place, we can let go. One or two angels are more powerful than we can even comprehend. God isn't just lord of one or two angels, or one or two armies of angels. He is the Lord of many armies of angles.

If the God who is your dwelling place also commands legions of angels is on your side, there is no need to be afraid. Yes, life will still be difficult at times, but you are not fighting alone. You have the Lord of Angel Armies fighting for you.

How deep is the ocean? The answer probably depends on what exact spot you're talking about, but it's fairly safe to say if you throw something overboard during an ocean cruise, you're never going to see it again. A tiny pebble can sink so fast no human can recover it. Even in shallow water things get lost. Maybe you're still missing the shoe that was tossed out of a canoe at summer camp when you were 15. If you've ever tried to skip rocks into a lake, you realized even though they felt big in your hand, they were small compared to the vastness of water. They quickly disappeared beneath the surface never to be seen again.

How often do we carry weights with us that feel like those rocks? For some reason, even when we ask for forgiveness, we have a hard time believing we have received it from Jesus. We hold onto shame like rocks. One by one, those rocks, both small and big, we hold on to cause us to sink. Instead of swimming in the dwelling place of God's love for us, we're drowning in self-loathing.

Today's reading tells us God takes our sins and throws them into the sea. He wants to be the living water that washes away all the dead weight we're carrying. You're not meant to hold onto those rocks weighing you down. You're meant to let Him love you and to love yourself. God is calling to you today, asking you to hand Him not just your sin, but also the shame you're carrying. No matter how big or small the weight of your shame seems, God wants to throw it so far away that it can never be found again. He wants His love and forgiveness to be where your heart dwells.

Do you have any idea what these words mean: yinz, youse, ya'll? All of them simply mean "you all" and are common in certain parts of the United States. You likely have some sayings unique to your region or town as well. You know what words are said and how they sound when spoken by someone from your hometown. There's a difference between saying a word and saying it with the familiarity of someone who makes their home in that place.

In today's scripture, Jesus talks about how a sheep know the unique voice of their shepherd. Sheep won't listen to just anyone. In fact, when approached by a stranger, they may run the other way, but when they hear their shepherd's voice, they come running. They know the unique way His voice sounds. They know the sound of their loving shepherd's voice means they're safe. Even if they're far from familiar pastures, they're at home when their shepherd is near. Their dwelling place isn't about where they live; it's about who they're with.

Learning to hear God's voice begins by spending time with Him. That includes prayer, worship, and reading Scripture. Sometimes, God can seem far away, like we're in a strange city full of noise, but listen for His voice. It might not be audible, but we may feel a little nudge inside. We may be worried about something, but then a familiar song comes on the radio putting a smile on our face. When we're praying about a decision, often something just seems to feel right in our spirits about making a certain choice. It takes time and practice to learn God's voice. Remembering how He's spoken to us in the past is a reminder of how He will speak to us now, even if we feel far from home. Even when our surroundings seem strange and scary, we're safe because our dwelling place is with our shepherd. He is speaking to us. He loves us and will gently care for us. When we make the presence of Jesus our dwelling place, we learn what His voice sounds like. We will hear His unmistakable voice whispering comfort, guidance, and love.

When you hear baby birds chirping, it's a sure sign of springtime. Winter storms are over, and there is warmth perfect for nurturing new life. Baby birds are safely tucked away in their nest under the wings of their parents.

What if the storms aren't over? What if it's so cold that even a minute without the protection from their parents means death for those baby birds? That's exactly what the weather is like when emperor penguins are born. Their chicks hatch in the middle of winter in Antarctica, the coldest time of the year at the coldest place on earth. There is no soft, warm nest or warmth from the sun. The chicks are nestled on top of their fathers' feet and protected by a layer of his warm feathers. Their fathers' feet are all that separate them from the ice, and their fathers' feathers are all that protects them from the swirling winds and cold, harsh weather.

What about you? Where do you go when it feels like a never-ending winter storm in your soul? Psalm 91:4 says:

He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart. NIV
