Have you ever looked at butterfly and thought about what it had to go through to become the stunning creature before you?

Butterflies lay their eggs in a hidden place, often on the leaves of the plants the soon to hatch caterpillars will to eat. They're only protection is the very plants they're laid on. Caterpillars may seem unassuming and plain, but it's their camouflage for protection. Just when they seem to peak as they continue to grow, caterpillars spin themselves into a chrysalis. Inside that dark place, the very cells of caterpillar are rearranged when it becomes a liquid state, completely unrecognizable as it forms into a butterfly. Just before the butterfly emerges, the chrysalis changes from opaque to clear. It's obvious the butterfly is cramped inside, but it can't rush the process of emerging. It has to go through its first awkward moments visible for all to see. Butterflies may be beautiful and seem delicate, but they are an important part of the survival this world because they pollinate plants. Then, they lay eggs so a new generation can start the process all over again.

We all go through phases like a butterfly. Sometimes we feel unprotected. We're often tempted to dismiss one part of our growth because it doesn't look as impressive as another. We wonder why we're just blending in when we want to stand out, or we wonder why we have to stand out when we feel so awkward. Just like a butterfly, each stage of our life is important and should be celebrated, no matter how it looks or feels.

Don't be afraid to celebrate who you and where you are in life. You're on a path of revealing God's uninhibited splendor. At times, you may feel vulnerable, unprotected, or even seen as nothing more than a delicate creature, but you brilliantly display God's wonder and splendor as you embrace who you are.

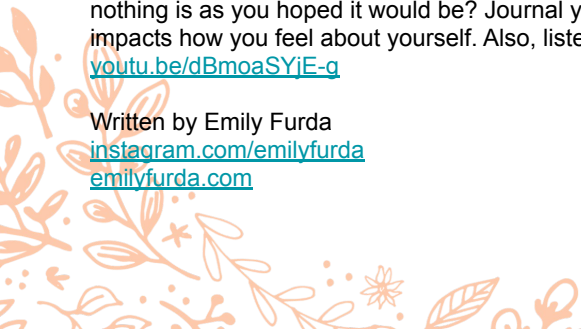

She brings out a side of you that is often hidden. All she wants is to belong, so you promise to invite her the next time you go out with your other friends, all the time hoping she won't remember. We remember David as a mighty warrior, someone who killed Goliath, a psalmist, and King of Israel. That's not how his family saw him. When Samuel came to David's father, Jessie, to choose the new king of Israel, Jessie didn't even think David was worth bringing out for him to see. Jessie thought his own son didn't have what it took to be king, so he left him out in the field with the sheep.

That had to hurt. Have you ever felt that way? You look at yourself and wonder what is wrong with you? You have things to offer, but those around you don't seem to notice or they underestimate you. All they see is the surface

That's the exact opposite of what God says. It didn't matter that Jessie tried to hide David from Samuel. God knew he was there, and Samuel wouldn't leave until he was anointed king. Even when no one else saw him, God saw David. The years David spend caring for sheep, guarding defenseless animals, helped prepare him to fight in battles and care for people as King of Israel. Sometimes, we go through times when we need to grow in private before we can fully use our gifts.

So often people look at only the outward appearance or things that can be measured. God isn't like that. He sees what's in your heart and knows your purpose. External appearances or lack of achievements don't change His mind. What He wants is your heart. Open your heart to Him and let Him make you into who He has called you to be. You're His daughter and are made complete because of Him. Don't wait another day to let God show you how He sees you. God knew a shepherd was really a king. He knows exactly who you are as well. You are never overlooked. You are royalty.

Do you ever feel as if your personality limits what you can do? Do you feel as if you have to be or do something uncomfortable just to fit into God's plan for you? You could be an extrovert who never stops talking and hugs a stranger while shopping for shoes (always ask first!). Maybe you're an introvert who thrives in calmness and feels drained when there's too many people. You could be an ambivert, a mix of both. You might not hug a stranger while shopping for a pair of boots, but for the most part, you're okay with both stillness and the overly talkative extrovert.

When God created you and your personality, He also created you with specific gifts. Sometimes it stretches you beyond what you're comfortable with. Other times it flows naturally.

Sometimes, it's surprising what someone can do. An extrovert who never stops talking might also be extremely observant and enjoy listening. You have no idea how she can know so much about others when she never seems to be quiet. An introverted person may come alive when she sings in front of a crowd, but when she leaves the stage, she needs some alone time, or at least quiet conversation. An ambivert may be willing to take the spotlight, but it's not necessary for her to be the center of attention in order for her to feel alive. She's happy in the silence but can hold her own with an extrovert who seems to never runs out of words and talks faster than seems humanly possible.

Don't let your personality stop you from using your gifts or make you think you're confined to one way of behaving. You can embrace your natural tendencies. God created you to uniquely fit in a place designed solely for you. Jesus promises in today's verse that when you let Him guide you, it won't be a burden. He will be by your side, helping you every step of the way.

What have you learned about living uninhibited this week?
Journal, draw, write a poem, or write a prayer about it below.

Sometimes, words said to us or things done to us hang around us like chains. Things we heard years ago as little girls, or even yesterday, can pierce our hearts with a wound that never seems to heal. Sometimes, people say and do things to intentionally hurt us. Abusive relationships, bullies, or someone just having a bad day and a big mouth can leave marks so deep we wonder if they'll ever heal. Other times, people say and do things without even realizing the effect it has. It can damage beautiful parts of us God created to be embraced and shared. We lock them away, and in the process, lock away part of who we are.

Someone may have made cruel comments about your weight. No matter your size, it can tear you to your core. You may have been told that you're a failure or will never be good enough. Maybe you had an interest in learning art but were overlooked because someone didn't want to take the time to unlock your talent. You may have tried out a new style of clothes only to hear people whisper when they thought you couldn't hear them. Sometimes, a comment can even be taken in an unintended way. Maybe a music teacher compared you to another student who seemed to have unmatched natural talent. She meant you can learn if you're willing to work harder than some of the other students, but you thought she meant you weren't good enough. A hurtful misunderstanding can be enough to make you stop playing all together, killing a part of you and taking away something you love.

So how we handle it when words or actions wound our hearts so deep we can't stop thinking about them in our minds even decades later? The verse today tells us to "be transformed by the renewing of your mind." NIV

We need to allow God to change those deep-seated beliefs we have about ourselves. It takes time and a willingness to truly embrace what God says about you. It may even be wise to seek a licensed counselor. Allowing God to renew your mind is hard work, but it's worth it. The freedom you will find is life changing. The gifts you thought were dead will come to life again. You will be able to live uninhibited embracing every part you.

James 1:27 says: Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world. NIV

In biblical times to be a widow meant you were completely dependent on someone else. It was rare to find a woman who could financially support herself. After her husband died, it was the job of her son to care for her. If she had no adult children or parents to turn to, she could be left at the mercy of others. Orphans were in the same situation: silenced, helpless, voiceless, and unloved.

No one person can help everyone in every way, but you can make a difference. Start where you are. Is there someone who needs something you could provide? It could be as simple as sending an extra sandwich with your child’s lunch to share with a classmate who forgot their lunch. It could be paying for a stranger’s groceries. Giving her the supplies or a gift card when money is tight, would meet the need and create memories for her. 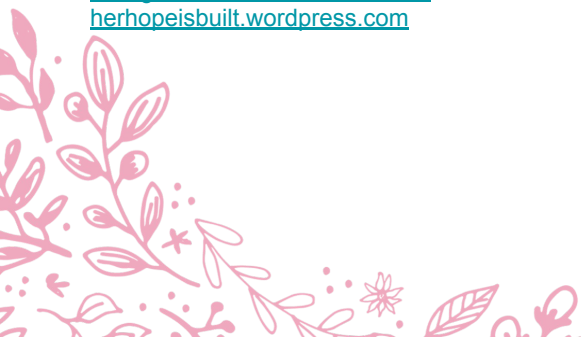

It's easy to look at someone who continues to fight no matter what is thrown her way, see her living, using her gifts, and assume she has all the strength and self-confidence she needs. It's easy to forget even the strongest among us, even the most revered leaders, need help at times. Even the most battle tested soldier sometimes needs help to be who she is meant to be and do what God has for her to do.

In today's passage, we see Moses needed help. As long as his hands were held up, the Israelites were winning the war they were fighting. If his hands fell, so did the troops. God told Moses to keep his hands up, but He never said Moses had to do it alone.

We see his brother and a friend come alongside Moses. They gave him a place to sit and held his arms for him. Perhaps this story is here to show us we need each other in order to live out our purpose. Moses needed help and those who helped him were just as vital for the victory of the battle as Moses was. We all need others to hold our hands sometimes. Just because someone is used to fighting a difficult battle and seems confident in who she is, doesn't mean she's capable of doing it alone.
